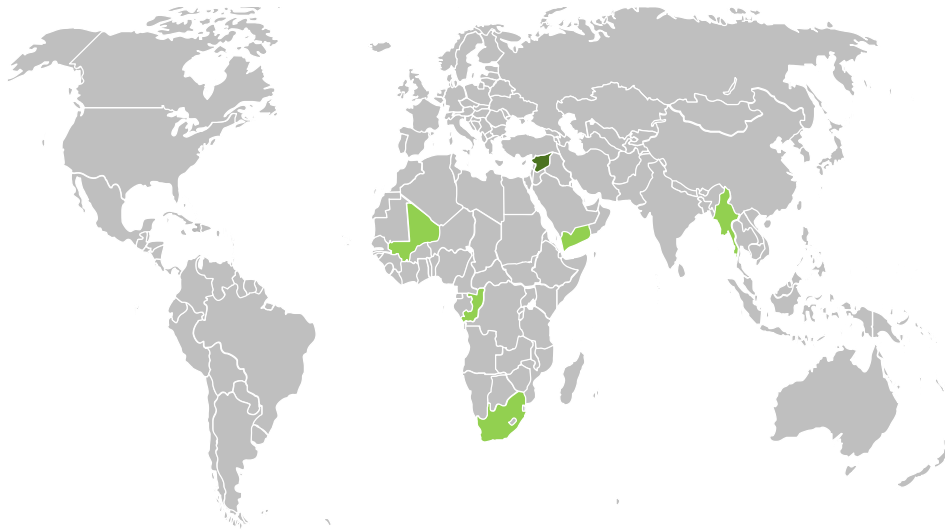


During the first six months of 2017, open-source monitoring identified 17 ambulances reportedly destroyed and 24 reportedly damaged in two countries. In 2016, 73 ambulances were reportedly destroyed and 55 damaged in three countries. In 2015, two ambulances were reportedly destroyed and seven damaged in three countries. This data is based on incidents identified by Insecurity Insight's monitoring of open sources using the Security in Numbers Database (SiND).
